If you're looking for the fastest way to find your home (or any location at all) on Google Street View, you should check InstantStreetView.com. This is a third-party website that lets you simply type any address in a search field to instantly show you that location on Street View. You can even use it from the web browser on your mobile device. These instructions apply to both desktops and mobile devices. When you start typing the name or address into the location you're looking for, the site will automatically search for a matching location and get you there if it finds it, even before you finish typing the entire location address. If what you understand is too vague, a drop-down list of options will appear as suggested locations that match your value. You can click the About button on the top menu bar located on the right to see a legend of the different colors that describe the search field, which changes depending on what you type in it and what the site can find. When you find the right place, you can use the mouse by clicking and dragging it around to change direction, and use the arrows at the bottom to move backwards, forwards or sideways. ShowMyStreet.com is another popular site that works very similarly to Instant Street View. However, no suggestions are opened in AutoComplete. The Instant Street View site is great if you want to look at a particular location immediately, but if you know how to use Google Maps already, then you can easily switch street view away too if the location you want to look at was taken by the Street View team. Keep this in mind every time you use Google Maps. Start by accessing Google Maps by navigating to the google.com/maps your web browser. Type a place or address in the search field on Google Maps, and then search for the little yellow blemish icon in the lower-left corner (in the shape of a small person). If you can't see their flaw, try simply clicking on the street opposite where you want to use Street View. Click the pop-up at the bottom of the screen. If you don't get a pop-up, it means street view isn't available for this location. When you click Pedman, a pop-up box appears on the left that includes Street View images. You can click on it to view it full screen so you can move and start exploring. The address you're looking at should appear on the right along with the date the picture was last updated and the Back button to return to maps. The Google Maps app isn't the same as the Google Street View app - they're separate apps. If you have an Android device, you can download the official Google Street View app from Google Play if for some reason you don't already have it. For iOS devices, Street View used to be built into the Google Maps app, but now there's a separate iOS Google Street View app you can use. Once you've downloaded the app (and may also be logged into your Google account), you can connect an address into the top search bar and Tap the map to place their flaw (human icon). The 360 images closest to it will appear below. Click on the picture below to see it full screen and use the arrows to navigate the area. Once full screen, drag your finger along the rocky roads to move around. Keep in mind that Google updates photos quite regularly, especially in major cities, and depending on where you're looking, the image might be old and scheduled for an update to better reflect its current state. Consider checking back in a few months or so to see if your home or address has been added to Street View. In what is the first (as far as I know) for a major U.S. city, Honolulu has banned viewing of smartphones and other personal electronic devices when crossing the road. The anecdotal answer, based on many English properties being sold at fixed prices to the end of double prices thanks to Banksy's murals painted on them, is yes.
